

Without delving into the history of Labor Day and how it became a national holiday, most of us recognize it as a day to relax and enjoy a day off from our regular toils in the workplace. I found it fitting that this year, the feast of St. Teresa of Calcutta fell on Labor Day. Who better to be recognized and celebrated for dedicating her life to caring for the poorest of the poor while living among them? Every morning, St. Teresa would recite this prayer:

Dear Jesus, help me to spread Thy fragrance everywhere I go. Flood my soul with Thy spirit and love. Penetrate and possess my whole being so utterly that all my life may only be a radiance of Thine. Shine through me and be so in me that every soul I come in contact with may feel Thy presence in my soul. Let them look up and see no longer me but only Jesus. Stay with me and then I shall begin to shine as you shine, so to shine as to be a light to others. Amen.

It reminds us that the reason we care for the bodily needs of others is that our love for them makes us long to bring their souls to Christ. Today, we prayed this together during our morning school assembly.

St. Teresa died on September 5, 1997. Pope John Paul II put into effect the expedited process of Mother Teresa's beatification a mere six years after her death. Like so many others around the world, he found her love for the Eucharist, for prayer, and for the poor a model for all to emulate. I don't think there is a better example of someone who lived our theme "Christ has no body on earth but yours."



The 5 Love Languages for Children

When I was a new mother of three children, I decided that I was going to treat each child the same. Stop laughing. It did not take long to realize how different they were. What worked for one child did not necessarily work for the other two. Sound familiar? I have read about the "5 love languages", but I never considered how it applied to children. When I researched the topic, I started noticing the love languages of my students. Here are the five love languages for kids explained. Knowing your child's love language can not only help them feel more loved, but also ensure that you make each of your children feel loved in their own love language. If you don't know what your child's love language is yet, consider taking this quiz on the five love languages website. Sit down with your kids and discuss it with them.

1. "Cuddle Me! Chase Me!" Physical Touch Love Language.

Is this your kid? Did your child run to the door, grab your leg, and climb all over you when they were younger. If children are constantly in your space, touching you, or playing with your hair, that is a signal that they need to be touched more.

Express love like this:

- Snuggle on the couch
- Let them sit on your lap
- Offer a foot message
- · High fives
- Wrestle and play sports that require jostling
- Give loud kisses all over their head (the way Cookie Monster eats a cookie)
- Have a secret handshake
- · Give hugs and kisses
- Read to your kids
- Tossing kids up into the air (safely)

Avoid doing this:

- A slap or spanking is devastating to one whose primary love language is touch
- Dads tend to become less physically affectionate when their daughters start to grow older because they feel ill at ease, make it a habit of good-morning and good-night hugs, even as kids get older.
- For children with this love language, they will receive love more deeply through these acts than through words or receiving gifts.

2 "Talk to Me!" Words of Affirmation Love Language

For kids who listen intently and speak sweetly, your loving words matter most.

Is this your kid? If your child beams whenever you praise them or offers you lots of sweet feedback—like a child pulls you close to whisper, "Mommy, you are my favorite mommy"—they relish words of affirmation.

Express love like this:

- Little notes in their lunch box
- Texts
- A bracelet with something like "my hero" printed on it can mean the world to these kids
- Get down on their level so you can look them in the eyes and says, "You are the best thing in my life. You are so
 important to me."
- "Gossiping" or whispering loudly to a stuffed animal, another adult, or even a bird outside about something your kid did well, since research shows we all believe more of what we overhear than what is told directly to us.
- To show your child love through this love language, consider not only telling them I love you but also words of
 praise when they have done something good.
- Ask to speak to your child while you are calling home.

Avoid doing this:

- Insults cut deep and it is particularly important for these kids to hear the words "I love you" standing alone, rather than, "I love you, but..." Tying those three words to anything else can imply that your love is conditional.
- For children with this love language, words are more powerful than actions. Words of praise and endearment and
 positive guidance are going to make them feel deeply loved. This is also true about yelling or scolding them when
 they are being bad. These words will not be soon forgotten and can really hurt them.

3. "Come Here! Look at This!" Quality Time Love Language

These children feel most valued when you choose to spend time with them. Is this your kid? A child who often says, "Watch this!" or "Play with me!" is begging for quality time. "Come to my room! I want to show you something."

Express love like this:

- In addition to just being together, offer your undivided attention.
- It can be short, but let your child choose the activity.
- One-on-one chats are important.

Avoid doing this:

- Putting a child in their room and isolating them, that is a severe punishment to that child.
- Do not assume that spending extra time together means that you need to abandon your to-do list. Even reading beside your child when they are absorbed in their own play will let them feel your warm presence.
- If your child's love language is quality time, this means they will need your full and undivided attention. This is your
 way of saying that you are important to me and that I want to spend time with you. This can make your child feel
 loved when you are available for them even when you are busy.
- Remember that it is not about the activity or how you are spending your time, but that you are together doing it.
- If you have more than one child, consider spending quality time together, but also one on one as well. This will make them feel more special and let them know that you are only focusing on them right now.

4. "Presents, Please!" Gifts Love Language

Children who feel loved when they receive things are not just pandering for more stuff. Instead, they are actively seeking ways to feel loved by you. Is this your kid? Someone whose primary love language is gifts tends to care about how a present is wrapped, and often remembers who gave them what for months or years after the fact. Another tip-off? Your kid has trouble throwing out things they have been given, even if they have not looked at them in ages. If receiving gifts is your child's primary love language, then they are going to view gifts as symbols of love from you. While many children will respond in a positive manner to gifts, if this is your child's love language, gifts can mean more than just something fun to do. Children may beg and even break down and cry for things, but for those who have gifts as their primary love language, they will respond differently.

Express love like this:

- Your child sees a gift as a symbol of your love, and it can be anything from a very smooth stone to a ball of yarn in just the color they mentioned liking two Tuesdays ago.
- Although it is fine to keep a closet full of wrapped dollar-store toys, you do not need to spend money.
- Try leaving an origami creation on your child's chair or a wildflower on their pillow.
- Stickers and star charts are also concrete ways of making these children feel valued.
- On the receiving end, be sure to make a big deal of any gifts your child gives you by hanging artwork or creating a
 "precious things" table for those sculptures made from pipe cleaners and old corks.

Avoid doing this:

- Avoid overdoing gifts.
- Give kids gifts that are appropriate for their age and that will be helpful to them, rather than just what they want.

5. "You Do it For Me!" Acts of Service Love Language

Acts of service is the most peculiar-sounding love language, but kids who speak it appreciate thoughtful
gestures, like buying flavored seltzer and making a mocktail complete with a mini umbrella and a pineapple
slice.

Is this your kid?

Your child may beg you to tie their shoes, fix a broken toy, or fluff his pillow. As a result, parents of these kids often end up feeling like servants, but it may help to reframe seeing those requests as simple requests to feel loved.

Express love like this:

- Make exceptions to a general rule helping a child dress when they are having a bad morning
- Going above and beyond (such as first warming their clothes in the dryer on a cold morning).
- Encourage self-reliance and expect them to do what they can for themselves at each stage of development but let them know you are there if needed.
- Walk your child through a new process and teaching him, step-by-step, how to be more capable.
- Children will communicate this by asking you to fix or do something for them.

Avoid doing this:

- Do not have to jump at every request. A thoughtful response will do, even if it's to deny an ask.
- Watch out for how those exceptions to rules pile up.

Scientist believes that love languages are like personality traits that stay with us for life, your child's preference might seem to change from moment to moment and stage to stage. A toddler who craves snuggles may grow into a 7-year-old who likes to roughhouse. A kid who basks in praise might become skeptical of your reassurance at some point and instead, just need a little quality time.
