



Did You Hear That? What Your Child's School Hearing Screening Means

All Louisiana school students, K through 12, must be screened for minimal hearing requirements every year. We have resumed screening after two years of Covid restrictions. Last Wednesday, we completed school hearing screening (audiogram) for grades K through 8th. Thanks to everyone who helped with this process. Special thanks to Michelle Newman and Abby Rauschenberger or their help.

Audiologists are not fond of school screening.

I agree with them. Most schools performed with lots of volunteers all on one day. While this seems like an efficient way to perform screening, a high number of students fail their screening and must be retested, or they are sent straight to the audiologist. Here's the problem. Many students fail due to non- hearing related issues such as attention span, colds, sensory issues and even learning styles. For all these reasons, I decided years ago to screen every student myself. I have been blessed with knowing each student well enough to reduce the factors I just mentioned. Therefore, we get an increased accuracy. Please remember, this is a school screening to measure minimally hearing capabilities. It does not replace a professional exam.

Just what are we testing for and why is it important?

Students should be able to hear a range of sounds. Loud, soft, high, and low sounds are needed to be heard to build vocabulary, concepts and even math skills. We screen 20 and 40 decibels at 1000, 2000 and 4000 hertz. These are the state requirements.

The Relationship Between Hertz and Decibels

Vibrating objects create waves of energy that change the pressure of the surrounding air. These pressure changes are picked up by the human ear and interpreted by our brains as sound. The waves of energy produce alternating positive and negative changes in air pressure, known as oscillations, which can be measured in hertz and decibels.

Sound Frequencies

When an object vibrates, the alternating positive and negative pressure creates a wave, also known an oscillation. A complete oscillation is measured in the frequency of waves per second. Hertz is the standard unit of measurement used to calculate the frequency of these oscillations. If one oscillation occurs in one second, the frequency is denoted as 1 Hertz. When 500 oscillations occur in one second, the frequency is denoted as 500 Hertz.

Pressure Changes

Humans hear vibrational energy -- or the changes in air pressure -- as sound. An object is perceived to be louder or quieter depending on the amount of air pressure generated by the vibrating object. This pressure changes regularly and dissipates for the listener as his distance increases from the source. Air pressure changes are measured in decibels.

The relationship between Hertz and decibels allows a listener to measure the frequency and perceived loudness of any sound. The frequency or amount of air pressure change vibration is measured in Hertz. The resulting change in air pressure created through the vibrating object is measured in decibels. Decibels, in effect, measure the loudness of a sound and Hertz measures the frequency of the sound.

Can you or your child hear sounds within the speech banana?

A speech banana is a banana-shaped range on an **audiogram** that covers the frequencies and decibels that are needed to understand speech. Contained within the speech banana are letters and letter combinations for these sounds. To understand the speech banana, let's first look at the audiogram. The audiogram is used to graph hearing sensitivity. Frequencies, also called pitch, are measured in Hertz (Hz). The frequencies on the audiogram start at the lower frequencies (or deeper pitches, such as a dog barking or the sound of a lawnmower) on the left and move to the higher frequencies on the right (such as birds chirping or bells ringing), like keys on a piano. Moving from top to bottom on the audiogram measures loudness in decibels (dB). The further down on the graph, the louder the sound needs to be to be heard. All the letters of the alphabet except /q/, /w/, /x/, and /y/ are within the speech banana. Also within the speech banana are the letter combinations /th/, /ch/, /sh/, and /ng/. Those letter combinations can be difficult for deaf and hard-of-hearing people to hear and understand.

The black box represents required testing for school screening. As you can see, it is a very small portion of sounds needed by your child. So why bother if we are doing minimum screening? If the required sounds are missing, there is a high probability that hearing loss is occurring in other areas.

Reasons for Short-Term (sudden or temporary) Hearing Loss:

- Middle ear infections
- Exposure to loud noise
- Accumulation of earwax
- Swimmer's ear
- Medication side effects


Sudden hearing loss in one ear without a clear reason is a medical emergency and should be treated promptly. he faster you get treatment, the better chance you have to regain your hearing. If you've been sick lately, this is important to tell your doctor, too—viral infections, including <u>mumps</u> and even <u>COVID</u>, have been linked to sudden hearing loss.

Reasons for Long Term (chronic or permanent) Hearing Loss

- Aging
- Chronic Loud Noise Exposure
- Occupational noises
- Recreational noises. from firearms and jet engines snowmobiling, motorcycling, carpentry or listening to loud music.
- Some medications
- Some illnesses. Diseases or illnesses that result in high fever

Hopefully, this simple article will paint a clearer picture on a complex subject. If you just skipped the whole article and are looking for the takeaway in the last few sentences, this is it. Don't assume your child is ignoring you when they don't answer you.


