



#### Hepatitis A Vaccine Will Be Mandatory for the 2023-2024 School Year in Louisiana- Here's Why

The Louisiana Office of Public Health (OPH) declared a statewide outbreak of hepatitis A virus (HAV) infections in December 2018. This increase in cases mirrored the Hepatitis A outbreaks occurring in other states. While HAV infections usually resolve without treatment, illnesses and deaths in the current national outbreaks have been higher than usual due to older age and underlying health conditions, especially chronic liver disease, of people affected.

#### What is Hepatitis A?

Hepatitis A is a highly contagious liver infection caused by the hepatitis A virus. It is a vaccine-preventable illness that is easily spread through close contact. It usually spreads when a person unknowingly ingests the virus from objects, food or drinks contaminated by small, undetected amounts of stool (feces) from an infected person. Hepatitis A can also spread from close personal contact with an infected person such as caring for someone who is ill. An infected person can transmit the virus to others up to two weeks before symptoms appear, and even those who do not experience symptoms can transmit the virus to others.

#### What are the Symptoms of Hepatitis A?

Symptoms include fever, fatigue, loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, dark urine, clay-colored bowel movements, joint pain, and jaundice (yellowing of the skin and eyes). **Most children younger than age 6 do not have symptoms when they have hepatitis A. If symptoms occur, they usually appear four weeks after exposure, but can occur as early as two weeks and as late as seven weeks after exposure.** Symptoms usually develop over a period of several days and last less than two months, although a small percentage of people (10-15 percent) can have symptoms for as long as six months.

#### **Hepatitis A Prevention**

The best way to prevent hepatitis A is through vaccination with the hepatitis A vaccine. Unvaccinated people who have been exposed recently (within two weeks) to the hepatitis A virus should get the hepatitis A vaccine or a shot of immune globulin to prevent severe illness. Practicing good hand hygiene – including thoroughly washing hands after using the bathroom, changing diapers, and before preparing or eating food – plays an important role in preventing the spread of hepatitis A.

#### Vaccination Recommendations

The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends routine hepatitis A vaccination for the following people:


- All children at age 1 year
- Travelers to countries where hepatitis A is common.
- Family and caregivers of adoptees from countries where hepatitis A is common.
- People with chronic or long-term liver disease, including hepatitis B or hepatitis C
- People with clotting-factor disorders
- People with direct contact with others who have hepatitis A
- Any person wishing to obtain immunity (protection)

#### **How Many Cases are There in Louisiana**

Since 1999, when routine HAV immunization of children was recommended by the ACIP of the CDC, the number of yearly reported cases of hepatitis A fell dramatically. As of **October 12, 2022**, Louisiana has 1,686 reported cases of HAV infection linked to the current outbreak. Sixty percent of infected individuals were hospitalized and seven died. Infections ranged from age one to 98.

#### Confirmed cases by Parish.

Here are the confirmed cases reported by parish. It is important to note the higher cases of Hepatitis A are centered around places where the population density is greater. East Baton Rouge, Livingston and to a slightly lesser extent Ascension Parish have higher numbers.



Whether or not we develop immunity to a disease often depends on our antibodies, which are proteins we produce in response to infection. They coat invading cells and, in the best case, prevent those invaders from hijacking our cells and replicating. The body does not really forget. Usually, when we get reinfected with a disease, it is not because our body has lost immunity. We get reinfected either because the germ mutated and our immune system no longer recognizes it, or our bodies tend to mount a much lower immune response.

#### Why Vaccinations Matter

If the pandemic taught us anything, herd immunity matters. Some people will receive vaccines and produce immunity to disease, and some will not.

#### Why is herd immunity important?

Herd immunity occurs when a large portion of a community (the herd) becomes immune to a disease. The spread of disease from person to person becomes unlikely when herd immunity is achieved. As a result, the whole community becomes protected — not just those who are immune. Often, a percentage of the population must be capable of getting a disease for it to spread. This is called a threshold proportion. If the proportion of the population that is immune to the disease is greater than this threshold, the spread of the disease will decline. This is known as the herd immunity threshold.

What percentage of a community needs to be immune to achieve herd immunity? It varies from disease to disease. The more contagious a disease is, the greater the proportion of the population that needs to be immune to the disease to stop its spread.

The vaccine you give your child may not only protect them from disease, but also members of the herd.
